 proper respect.
- Host/assist with a community fireworks show
- Visit veterans' homes or long-term care facilities and bring small American Flags for the residents to display.
- Participate in a local parade with your color guard or create a parade float. You can have members walk the parade route and pass out information on flag etiquette.

Flag Etiquette at Parades

When the American Flag is being carried by a color guard or with a group of flags:

- Stand up.
- Remove your hat.
- Place your right hand over your heart, veterans salute.
- Remain silent.

Note: It is not necessary to salute every American Flag that passes
